DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT



Covid-19 has intruded into one more year of our life. Yet the happiness is, we have now earned the strength to fight back the deadly virus. With condolences to all the people whom the pandemic has taken away from us over the year, let me tell you “We shall overcome.”

2021-22 was a challenging year for all of us at Jan Vikas Sansthan too. But I am happy that our people have taken a valiant effort to help the members of deprived communities around us, with special focus on the Musahar community. JVS, over the years, has been trying to pull up the marginalized communities, one step up the ladder. Every year we see people around us learn the methods to climb one step up. This is where our happiness lies. The strength of our work lies in the energy that our community member conveys to us by bringing things into action.

Our focus of the year was on Covid-19 recovery. A number of our community members had lost jobs due to the pandemic. Joining them with the MGNREGA with special focus on women was the main agenda we undertook in the gone year. Along with this ration distribution and medical camps were conducted.

With remarkable confidence we are submitting this report before you. This contains all the activities we have undertaken to touch the lives of the untouched. In the process, we came across more than 20,000 families. With effective strategies and strong approach we have achieved more than what we did in the last year.

Jan Vikas Sansthan is one of the fewer organizations in the district Jaunpur which works predominantly for the welfare of Musahar and other Dalit communities. JVS aims to establish itself as an organization that extends a helping hand to those who are deprived. The current works of the organization proves the point. The year 2021-22, was also affected by the spread and threat of Covid-19. Many migrant labourers who were forced to come back home, could not find a job and were facing extreme poverty. Considering the situation Jan Vikas Sansthan, with support from Azim Premji Foundation brought up a new project named Covid Rural Livelihood Relief. The project aimed to provide livelihood opportunities to the families of the migrant labourers promoting them to work under the MGNREGA scheme. 3955 families found relief and benefits of various kinds from the initiative.

Jan Vikas Sansthan also started its vaccination project with support from the Azim Premji Foundation during the financial year. The project aimed to promote vaccination especially among the marginalized communities, ending their blind believes and wrong speculations. We at JVS, ran a campaign to promote vaccination. Door to door campaigns saw good results as 19554 first doses and 56873 second doses of vaccination were administered during the period. This is in exception to the vaccination drives conducted in the brick klins. 314 people were vaccinated from the brick klins.

Azim Premji Foundation also supported to give lives to our dream subject of empowering the adolescent community. Project Udaan, aimed to empower the adolescents aged between 11-19, which was brought into effect from the previous year, saw its full-fledged activities in the year 2021-22. 4000 adolescents from 40 Gram Panchayat has joined with the team, and are acquiring life skill and leadership lessons from the community developers.

Andheri Hife, Germany is supporting the project aiming the overall development of marginalied community members in the 9 gram panchayats of Machhlishahar block of Jaunpur

district. 1018 families are benefitting from the project. The project activities include training to the Bal Manch members, Strengthening the women members through capacity building programmes, promotion of livelihood and empowerment of adolescent girls and young women.

The organization is also working for the welfare of young children upto the age of 6, by providing them milk and biscuits on a daily basis. Musahar, Nat, Dharikar and other Dalit communities in the areas are facing the issues of malnourishment in a large scale. Considering the fact, with support from Jiv Daya Foundation, the project was implemented.

Humanitarian reliefs were also provided to help the families affected by the deadly virus. 1000 families were provided ration with support from the Azim Premji Foundation and Medical support were provided to the Musahar community members with support from Andheri Hilfe.

Achievement of the Year



The year 2021-22 saw Jan Vikas Sansthan achieve some of its greatest achievements over the years. The organization works mainly for the welfare of women and children from marginalized communities. We were able to promote the value of honour among the communities and promote them to be part of the electoral politics. As a result the village Hiranpur and Bodepur panchayats of Machhalishahar block now have a Musahar gram pradhan, the first in the history of Musahars of Jaunpur. We believe this as our greatest achievement of the year. Jan Vikas Sansthan does not engage in any kind of politics, and is an independent organization. But the growth of our people from being apolitical to political is important to us.

The year also saw us engaging in a number of other activities like the theatre of oppressed, Maha sammelan of the Musahar and Dalit women, Covid relief efforts to help the affected people, Promotion of vaccination among the communities, Extension of Livelihood support to the migrant labourers who lost jobs owing to the pandemic and so. The year also saw a growth in the annual turnover of the organization, which is a testimony to our growth as a people's organization.

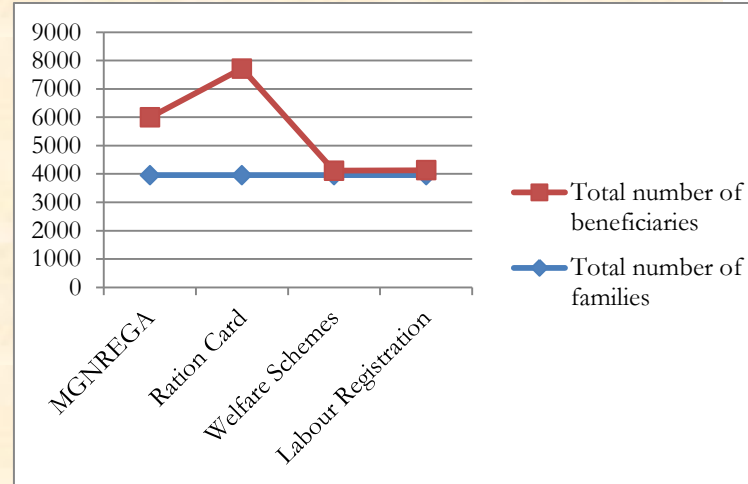

COVID RURAL LIVELIHOOD RESPONSE

The Mission of the project was to help the community affected by Covid-19, especially the families of the migrant labourers who lost jobs owing to the pandemic. MGNREGA was the main focus of the programme. Other welfare schemes like the Pension schemes, Kisan Samman Nidhi and Labour Registration were also given prime importance under the project.

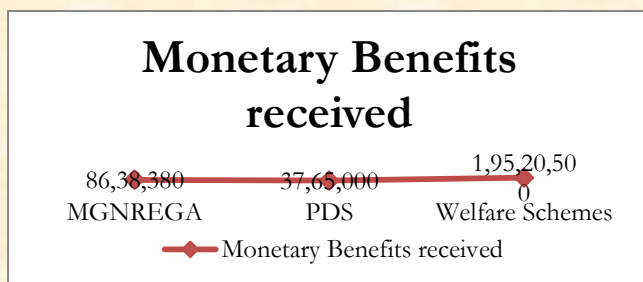

The project identified 3955 families who were found necessary beneficiaries, in the household survey conducted during the months of August- September. 3469 applications were filed during the project period under the MGNREGA, PDS and other Welfare Schemes. 750 families were provided with seeds of various vegetables to begin Kitchen Garden of their own.





Activities Conducted Under CRLR

1. Panchayat Level Meetings

Meetings were organized with the identified families regularly by the field staff, disseminating information on the eligibility for various government schemes like the MGNREGA. The Objective of the meetings was to initiate

discussions with the community on the Government schemes, its eligibility, process of application and others as per the need. 1200 members participated, of which 910 were women and 290 were men.

2. Panchayat Level Help Camps

Three help camps were conducted by the project team during the project tenure. Help camps were organized to facilitate submission of applications under the various Government schemes from the eligible households. 2820 people benefitted out of the programme. 3469 applications were submitted to the concerned officials by the project team after the Help camps.

3. District and Block Level Interface Programmes

District and Block level designated Government officials attended the Interface programmes to initiate direct discussions with the community members discussing their difficulties in submitting the eligible applications. The community interacted directly with the concerned officials. Around 60 CBO Leaders attended the programme and raised their concerns.

4. Seed Distribution

Vegetable seeds were distributed to 750 Musahar families to begin Kitchen Garden. The families selected were of those who were facing difficulties in finding works during the Covid-19 period. Many of the members had lost their daily wage jobs during the period. 716 families successfully cultivated the vegetables by their own.

5. Capacity Building of Women CBO Leaders

CBO leaders were provided training to continue the initiatives after the end of the project tenure. 60 women CBO leaders participated from the 30 gram panchayats. They were given training on the application process for various Government schemes.

6. Training on Organic Farming

60 selected members from the field were provided training on Organic Farming to ensure success of the Kitchen Garden.



VACCINATION PROJECT

COVID-19 spread rapidly all over the country during the reporting period. But, thankfully the science has delivered and vaccines were introduced. In spite of all the calls by the Government, respected personalities and the officials from the medical field, rumours regarding the vaccines were spread among the common people. The rumours were running faster the spread of the pandemic.

Like always, the communities living at the brinks of the society, who are deprived of education and quality life were the ones at the receiving end of the rumours. It spread among them with multiple effects. It was necessary to wipe off all the hesitations and make them safe by getting vaccinated. Joining hands with Azim Premji Foundation, this mission was initiated in the Machhalishahar and Baksha blocks of Jaunpur district.

Activities Conducted under Vaccination Project

1. Household survey

The project team initiated the process of the project through household survey in all the selected Gram panchayats. The survey was conducted to identify the vaccinated and non-vaccinated people in each of the selected panchayats. The process provided an image on the number of people to be vaccinated during the project tenure. 39221 houses from the Machhalishahar block and 5439 houses from Baksha block were surveyed by the project team.

2. Staff Capacity Building

All the selected staff were given training on the nature of work, responsibilities under the project and the nature of work of the organization. The project team was inspired to ensure 100% vaccination among the selected communities to fight back the deadly virus. 33 CRPs, 5 DEOs, 5 CHWs and the Project Manager attended the training process. The team was provided information on the working of the vaccination against the virus.

3. Line Listing of Community members

The project team conducted the line listing of the non-vaccinated people in each of the selected gram panchayats. The line listing of the community members helped in planning the further process of action to be initiated to ensure 100% vaccination in the village. Plans were made age wise to attract the non-vaccinated people.

4. Liaisoning with Authorities

The actions initiated under the project were in close association with the concerned authorities. Mr. Vishal Singh Yadav of Machhalishahar CHC and Mr. G.K. Singh of Baksha block had extended their wholehearted support to the programme. Once or twice a week the field developments were shared with the concerned officials by the Project Manager. This helped in better planning and execution.

5. Village Level Meetings

As part of the process, the Community Mobilization events were conducted by the project team at the village level. The community were mobilized through

shrining of facts and figures related to the Covid-19. Efforts were made to ensure the sharing of factual information and to prevent the spread of rumours.

6. Preparation of IEC Materials

IEC materials were prepared and distributed among the community to ensure that right information are reaching them. The materials prepared included information on Corona virus, its spread, the necessity of 100% vaccination with facts, figures and scientific explanation.

7. Vaccination Camps

708 camps were organized by Jan Vikas Sansthan over the 6 month period. The camps were organized in support with the Community Health Centers. It was organized at different timings to suit the daily wage workers, so that they do not have to miss the day's work to get vaccinated.

8. Selfie Corners

The project team initiated selfie corners at the vaccination points to attract more youths. The selfie point had the slogan "I am vaccinated, I am Safe".

9. Door to door Campaign

The team also conducted a door to door campaign to help the persons with disability and elderly people to get vaccinated. The vaccination team visited the PwD and elderly at homes and were vaccinated. The drive also ensured the non-vaccinated, non-disabled people to get vaccinated at their homes. In the process, the community were also made aware on the methods to keep themselves safe from the virus.

10. Brick Klin Camps

Jan Vikas Sansthan also initiated a brick kiln centralized vaccination drive. The migrant labourers were neither mobilized nor were they able to attend the camps owing to their work schedule. The workers were thus vaccinated at the klins itself. 314 migrant labourers from 24 klins were vaccinated thus.

UDAAN: BREAKING THE SILENCE ABOUT ADOLESCENT RIGHTS TO END CHILD MARRIAGE AMONG MUSAHAR AND DALIT COMMUNITIES

CHILD MARRIAGE is a social evil. It restricts the rights of adolescents to get quality education, good health services and denies them an opportunity to receive a proper livelihood. UDAAN aims to end child marriage among the communities Jan Vikas Sansthan works with. It also envisions to raise awareness about the rights of the adolescents to get quality education and proper health services. UDAAN covers all aspects of an adolescents rights and empowers them through its various capacity building programmes.

The project was implemented in 40 gram panchayats of Machhallishahar and Mariyahu blocks of Jaunpur district. 4107 adolescents are joined with us through the programme. The adolescents joined with the project belong to the age group 11-19. A collective named “Sapno Ki Toli” is formed in each of the gram panchayats that consists of 30-40 adolescent girls and boys, of the age 11-14, in the ration 70:30. The other adolescents belonging to the age group 15-19 forms the Peer leaders group.

The project also envisions to build up an environment that is adolescent friendly in the villages the project is implemented. For the purpose, it also works with the parents of the adolescents joined with the project. Meetings are organized with the parents especially, mothers of the adolescents and discussions on bringing up an adolescent friendly environment at home and outside are held.



Activities Conducted under UDAAN

1. Monthly Training of Sapno Ki Toli

One of the most prominent activity of the project is the monthly training of the adolescents joined along with. The adolescents are trained on various aspects like the child rights and girls education. A handbook was developed by the project team which begins with the identification and understanding of oneself, covers modules on dreams of the adolescents, rights of children, education, health and ends with a proper career guidance chart.

In “Sapno Ki Toli”, the adolescents talk about their dream, identify their passion and learn and develop skills to achieve them.

2. Monthly meeting with Peer Educators

Meetings are also organized with the peer group members on a monthly basis. The peer members are oriented on the different ways of working of a peer educator, the role of a peer leader and are also oriented on the ways to develop leadership skills in them.

3. Monthly meeting with the Nari Sangh

Meetings are conducted monthly with the Nari Sangh members. The members of the Nari Sangh are motivated to send their children daily to school, discussions are made on the convenient environment for a fruitful development of their children into better adults. Other factors related to the educational and health of the adolescents is also discussed during the meeting. The meeting with the Nari Sangh are used to awaken the parents on the adolescent needs and requirements.

4. Block level Training of Peer Leaders

One day training was organized under the project for the selected leaders of Peer Members at the

block level. The programme was organized on 27th and 28th January 20

22 at Machhalishahar and Mariyahu respectively. The meeting discussed the role of peer educators, skills of a good leader, the activities planned under the project, the role of peer group members in leading other adolescents in the village etc. A video showing a peer leader named Hajira working to eliminate drug use among children of her village was shown to the members. The video shows an inspirational work which others can imitate. The peer leaders also took oath to work for the betterment of children of their village.

5. Orientation of Frontline Functionaries

The project also conducted an orientation session for the frontline functionaries like the ASHA and AWW. The objective of the meeting was to make the frontline functionaries aware about their role and responsibilities in the village. The meeting also discussed with the stakeholders the aim, goal and objectives of the project, concerns of the community we work with, the health concerns of the communities and the ways to improve the health of the adolescents from the vulnerable communities. The programme began on 12th of November and ended on 25th of November 2021.

6. School Chalo Abhiyaan – Rally

Hardly do the children from Musahar community attend school. Caste based and traditional reasons are there behind their absence. In other Dalit communities as well the rate of school going children are less. It was to encourage them that the school chalo abhiyaan was organized. The campaign was organized in all the 40 gram panchayats, from 1st of September 2021 to 15th of September 2021. The campaign was followed by

school enrolments of out of school and drop out children.

7. Meeting with Panchayat level stakeholders

One meeting with all the panchayat level stakeholders was also organized under the banner of Udaan. The meeting was attended by the ASHA, AWW, ANM, School Teachers, Gram Pradhan, BDO, BC Sakhi, Rozgar sevak, Other SMC members etc. Discussions on the role of each of the stakeholders in improving the living environment of the adolescents were held. The meeting also discussed the goal, aim and objectives of the project. The meeting was held on 20th of January 2022 to 2nd of February 22.

8. Theatre of Oppressed

A street play named “Muniya Ki Udaan” was organized in all the project areas during the month of December 2021. The play displayed a young girl achieving her dream of becoming a doctor overcoming reluctant parents who were once trying to marry her off at the age of 14-15, which she surpassed with the help of the childline. The objective was to create among the community members unity against child marriage. Girls education and Child rights were also displayed through the play before the community. The play saw good crowd everywhere. The community members also took oath to not conduct child marriages at their homes by signing in the banner displayed at the place of occurrence of the play.

9. Development of IEC Materials on the Rights of Adolescents and Prevention of Child Marriage

Information, Education and Communication materials are developed by the project team to spread the messages on rights of adolescents and prevention of child marriage. 5 types of posters are developed by the team that speaks about the above mentioned themes. The posters are displayed on the areas where the community meetings of the project are conducted.

Improving the Life of Women and Children from Dalit and Musahar Community

Development of Dalit and Musahar community forms the focus of work of Jan Vikas Sansthan. Andheri Hilfe supported project thus envisions to bring considerable changes in the life of Women and children from the Musahar and other Dalit communities. A number of activities are organized under the project to ensure proper health services to the community members. The education of children is promoted through campaigns and rallies. Musahar community members are deprived of education. Many children who were promoted to get enrolled in the nearby schools are the first generation learners from the community.

Activities Conducted under ILWCDM

1. Dalit Women Dasha Dishha Sammelan

Jan Vikas Sansthan organized the Dalit women Dasha Dishha Sammelan. The sammelan was organized as part of strengthening the women Community Based Organizations (CBOs). Around 210 community members attended the programme organized at the Shyamsundar Palace, Machhalishahar. A number of Government representatives like Machhlishahar Block GraminAjivika Mission officer Mr. Himanshu Tripathi, I.C.D.S. representatives Ms. Geeta Rai and Pramila Devi, CHC Machhalishahar Superintendent Dr. Vishal Singh Yadav etc participated shared their valuable information regarding the respective departments. Many of the community members stated that they are attending a Sammelan for the first time in their life and shared their experience of being a strong part of Jan Vikas Sansthan.

2. Musahar women Dasha Dishha Sammelan

Similar to the Dalit women Sammelan, Musahar women sammelan was also organized by Jan Vikas Sansthan. This brought together the Musahar women from different areas together. The programme was attended by 104 women. It was organized on 26th of October 2021 and was held at the Shyam sundar palace, Machhalishahar. The programme was presided by Geeta Banbasi, the newly elected president of Hiranpur Gram Panchayat. The chief guests spoke about the

importance of education, especially motivated the community to send their girl children to schools. The sammelan also shared to the community the important points mentioned in the Prevention of Women from Domestic Violence Act, 2005.

3. Health check-up Camp and Medical Support

The core focus of the project is the Musahar community in the project area. Musahar community is provided special attention in the organized activities under the project. A health camp and medical support was thus organized by JVS for the Musahar community, focussing specially on the women and children from the community. 953 Dalit and Musahar community members benefitted from the programme. The second wave of the pandemic was more disastrous and was affecting the health of the community severely. The main aim of the health camp organized by the Organization is to provide health services to the children and women from Musahar and Dalit families in the selected Gram Panchayats who were unable to attend to their needs during the Pandemic.

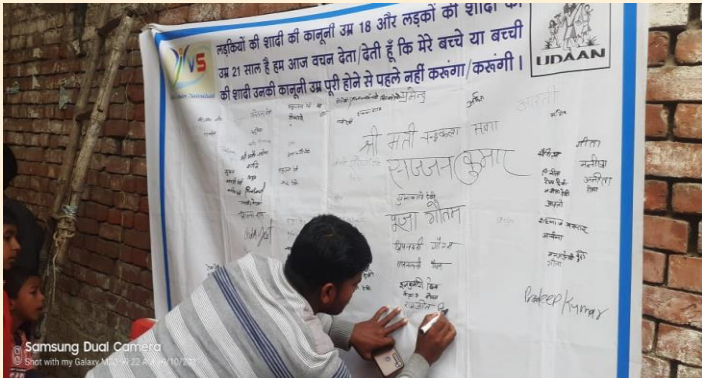
4. Milk Powder distribution

Milk powder was distributed to 300 selected Musahar families from 5 different gram panchayats under the project. Children from the Musahar community are largely malnourished and does not get to intake nutritious food owing to the pernicious poverty of the community. The families were selected on the basis of the children below the age of 5.

EDUCATION & NUTRITION SUPPORT PROJECT

Milk Project was initiated by Jan Vikas Sansthan with the support from Jiv Daya Foundation. The project aims to address the malnourishment reported among the children from Dalit and Musahar communities. For the purpose, 1.5 ml of milk is distributed to all children upto the age of 6. The children assembled to drink milk are also taught the basics of English, Maths and Hindi. Uniforms and sweaters were distributed among the children. The goal of the programme is to bring all the children together and instill in them an urge to attend schools. Mostly, our children are dropped off from schools due to carelessness and marginalization.

Activities conducted under the project

1. Milk and Biscuit distribution

Jan Vikas Sansthan distributes Milk and biscuits to 220 children between the age group 0-6. Each one of the children is provided 1.5 ml of milk and 2 biscuits on a daily basis. Most of the children were underweight before joining the programme.

The programme runs in 4 villages, mainly focussing the Musahar hamlets.

Malnourishment is a serious issue in the musahar hamlets even today. Very few of the children are found to be in normal weight and height. With providing milk on a daily basis we hope to address the issue of malnourishment among the children.

2. Tri-cycle and wheelchair distribution

Tri-cycle and wheelchairs were distributed to the identified Persons with Disability from different different panchayats. In the rural villages, the visibility and accessibility of the PwD is more in crisis. With low income and backwardness the PwD hardly get access to use wheelchairs or tricycles. This results in limited transportation and involvement in the general public matters. The tricycle holders shared their future plan of opening a shop of their own in the villages.

JVS distributed 28 tricycles and 12 wheelchairs to the identified Persons with Disability. The distribution was meant to improve their mobility and thereby improving their involvement in the society.

3. Bicycle distribution to labourers and adolescent girls
Bicycles were distributed to 14 labourers and 6 girls who belonged to poor financial background. Cycles were distributed to improve their transportation facility, especially for adolescent girls to reach school. The cycles were distributed at the Machhalishahar office of Jan Vikas Sansthan.

4. Dry Ration support

2021 was also affected by the deadly pandemic, covid-19, which had made the lives difficult for many daily wage and migrant labourers. The musahars were the worst affected. They who live in mud houses even today could not afford even the basic food items due to their loss of job during the time. Hence, Jan Vikas Sansthan extended support to 295 families suffering from job loss and lack of financial stability. The dry ration kit contained rice, wheat, oil, potato and pulses.



The efforts of Jan Vikas Sansthan, in its partnership with Jiv Daya Foundation is to bring considerable changes in the lives of the Musahars, especially in the educational and nutritional status of children from the community. The activities implemented are all with this purpose.

स्वास्थ्य शिविर का आयोजन किया गया। जिसमें कुल 92 महिला वरुष व बच्चे का इलाज किया गया। जन विकास संस्थान के परियोजना समन्वयक बंसी लाल माली द्वारा बताया गया कि संस्थान द्वारा इस तरह से मुसहर समुदाय की निःशुल्क स्वास्थ्य शिविर का आयोजन मछलीशहर के नौ ग्राम पंचायत महापुर, खारखावा, नदान, सरायबीका, रामपुरकला, बोडेपुर,

220 से अधिक परिवारों को बीज बैंक और 300 सी से अधिक परिवारों को किचन गार्डन कार्यक्रम से जोड़ा गया है। इन्हें संस्थान की ओर से निःशुल्क उल्लम किस्म के बीज समय-समय पर सहयोग के रूप में दिया गया। राजमणि ने बताया कि बक्शा के शंकरगढ़, सिकरारा के रड्या व मांडियाहू के हिरामनपुर व सरायबीका गांव के कुल 300 मुसहर बच्चों के लिए मिल्क परियोजना का संचालन किया जा रहा है। सी से अधिक परिवारों को अब तक कृषि विज्ञान केंद्र बक्शा से प्रशिक्षण दिलाया गया है, जिससे दलित समुदाय मशरूम उत्पादन एवं उपयोग कर आर्थिक स्थिति ठीक करने के साथ ही अपना स्वास्थ्य भी सुधार सकें। कुपोषण से बच्चों को बचाने के लिए बकरी की सहायता दी जाती है। राजमणि कहते हैं कि अभी तक 150 लोगों को बकरी दी गई है। एक के बाद दूसरे परिवार को बकरी सौंप दी जाती है।

SUCCESS STORIES FROM THE FIELD



Roshni belongs to the Musahar community, the most backward community in the state of Uttar Pradesh. In her community, hardly does the children attend school regularly especially for girls, who are married off at very young ages. Her journey to school is a long one. She used to go to school by walk.

Roshni's mother Sarita is a member of Ujala Nari Sangh, a CBO formed by Jan Vikas Sansthan in the village Rampur Kala, Roshni's village. In the meetings conducted by the organization, it was informed that women can earn a living and work under the MGNREGA scheme run by the Government. Sarita was promoted to demand job under MGNREGA. she completed all the process with help from the Community Developer.

She worked under MGNREGA for about 12-14 days a month and with the money she received, bought a cycle for her daughter Roshani. Now Roshani is happily able to make her way towards school in her new cycle and Sarita is happily earning a living from the MGNREGA scheme.



Shakuntala Gautam, belongs to the Dalit community from the village Karaura in the Machhalishahr block of Jaunpur district. She belongs to an economically and socially backward family, where two time meal is hard earned. Women in her family never used to go for work earlier. Her family used to make beedi as a source of earning but Shakuntala was not able to start the business by her own despite knowing how to make beedi. She started working under MGNREGA, inspired by Jan Vikas Sansthan, after joining the CBO formed as part of CRLR project. But she did not restrict herself there. From the money she earned from MGNREGA, she started her Beedi business. The beedi business was known to her from her parents but Shakuntala was lacking capital to start her own business. After her work under the Rural Employment Scheme, she received the capital to begin her business.
